It is the student's responsibility to know and meet the requirements for graduation.

A minimum of 36 credits must be upper division classes (300 and above).

Extended Major - In lieu of obtaining a minor in another discipline, history majors may choose the "extended major" option in history. To fulfill the extended major option students are required to complete an additional twelve upper-division (300-400 level) credits in history courses. These courses can be in any combination chosen from among the restricted electives offered by the history program. These credits are in addition to the other general education, language requirements, history major requirements, and minimum credits required for a degree. Students who seek this option do not have to obtain a minor in another discipline.

<sup>^</sup> Transfer students may use other foreign cultural courses they may have taken at another institution to fulfill this requirement upon approval by the History Department. History majors and extended majors in history who choose history courses from the above options will still have to fulfill the required number of credit hours of upper division courses in history in addition to the 6 credit hours chosen from this list.
