Inclusive Language

As a society or culture evolves, its language evolves to reflect those changes within that society. In modern America, word meanings are changing and assuming new meanings rapidly. Both genders are now entering those professions previously dominated by the opposite sex. Using terms that specify the gender of an individual in a particular occupation is no longer acceptable.

Pronouns

The use of the pronoun "he" as a general referent is no longer acceptable as it excludes all females. As no gender neutral singular pronoun currently exists, the following are suggested solutions:

1. Pluralize the sentence to avoid a gender-specific singular pronoun.

Instead of this: A student living in the dorm is free to come and go as he chooses. Use this: Students living in the dorm are free to come and go as they choose.

2. Rewrite the sentence without the pronoun

A student living in the dorm is free to come and go at any time.

3. Use the double pronoun construction.

A student living in the dorm is free to come and go as he or she chooses.

Occupational Titles

It is important to be aware of occupational titles that traditionally indicated the gender of the individual. The following examples show the outdated and current forms of several of these titles:
