- **Space for the UHP** – We have renewed our quest for space and turned to the deans of the colleges for help. They have started to get back to us with ideas, and, as a result, momentum is building for space for next year and, perhaps, earlier. Here is the request the deans are responding to: it would be helpful to have space rather like the Women's Studies room that could serve as a combination seminar room and student study area/lounge and an office relatively nearby for the director. 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HONORS PROGRAM

University Honors Graduate

University Honors Graduate Requirements

To earn recognition as a University Honors Graduate, a student must have 15 honors credits, including the honors capstone. This option is available for students who enter the UHP with 45 or more credit hours.

Required Course:

HONR 499 Honors Problem-Solving Capstone (3 credits)*

*A department capstone that contains the following elements may be substituted for honors capstone:
original research or creative scholarship,
written interpretation or analysis, and
public presentation or a defense.

Choose the 12 elective honors credits from:

- honors sections of General Education courses
- HONR special topic seminars
- specially designated departmental seminars
- honors contracts
- honors independent study courses
- internships

At least 9 credits must be 300-level or higher.
