

### WESTERN REGIONAL HONORS CONFERENCE

The 2018 Western Regional Honors Council Conference will be held at Chapman University in Orange, California from April 13-15. Honors students will present their research and projects at this annual conference attended by Honors programs from 14 Western States. Last year, our own Jehremy Felig presented his work on the relationship between research and high school teaching at the 2017 conference at Southern Oregon University. We paid his expenses and will pay for those for anyone whose work is accepted this year.

Over the summer, Hannah Hanser studied in Scotland as part the University of Missouri Kansas City's Honors program and earned 6 honors credits. This year MSUB will be offering study abroad opportunities that will offer honors credit. Arrangements are underway for a trip to Peru right after the school year ends in May. The credits will count at as part of the student's spring semester load, and so there won't be an extra charge for tuition.
