Susan Gilbertz called the meeting to order at 3:40 p.m. in the Chancellor's Conference Room.

The minutes of November 2 were accepted as presented.

I. CHANCELLOR REPORT

Dr. Larsen noted that the special legislative session ended and we know our budget cut will be 1.23% this year, which we will make up for in reserves. For FY19, we will need to realign our budget for that cut, as well as reduced income for the six mill levy. The mill levy is not generating funding as quickly as expected, so together the state budget cut and mill levy shortfall make our MSUB budget cut 1.65%. The University Budget

Committee (UBC) planned for a 1.5% cut, so they will begin meeting in January to work on the additional cut. Chancellor Larsen hopes to move to a position of sustained growth. He noted that there is room for growth in high school graduates, since the national average is 50% of high school graduates choosing to attend college. Montana's rate is only 40% of graduates, so there is room to recruit additional students.

It was noted that the Senate's role is to encourage new curricula and innovation. Especially with new programs, there are many, many steps, so start early!

Dr. Larsen stated the Community Task Force has written a draft report. It will be distributed to the campus community for comments and feedback, hopefully next week, before being finalized.

Vice Provost Redinger reported that Provost Hoar is at a Complete College America conference. MSUB is in the "sweet spot" for providing higher education for low income students, changing their lives for the better.

It will be up to the Department of Educational Theory & Practice to revive this program at the appropriate time.

VII. DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS

A. CARE Gender/Tenure/Discipline Bias Report

There has been a complaint about the CARE grant award process about bias. Dr. Gilbertz asked Cindy Bell, Director of Grants & Sponsored Programs, to report on the awarding. Ms. Bell put together a short report on last 10 years of CARE grants, which the Executive Committee reviewed, and then asked for a more comprehensive report of as far back as we can go. The data seems to indicate there is a bias against the arts and humanities, compared to other disciplines. The application and/or evaluation sheet may be structured to lean toward the sciences, so Senators are asked to review those. The CARE Committee is made up of junior faculty, so we now have a tenured co-chair on the Committee. The Committee is also considering having faculty present their applications

in person to the Committee, as well as rewriting the bylaws to indicate which disciplines should be represented. Senators will review the report and it will be discussed further at the next meeting.

B. New Textbook Ordering Process

The new system, where books are not stocked in the bookstore but rather ordered online by students, will begin for Spring 2018. Please get the word out to as many students as possible. It was noted that students will be expecting to walk into the bookstore and buy their books, often on the first day of classes, and now they will have to be ordered and shipped. Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Joe Oravecz stated that notices to students will be going out in a variety of ways, including emails from the bookstore and messages on D2L. Dr. Oravecz urges faculty to let all students in their classes know as well.

C. Gen Ed Committee Recommendation to Administration on ETS Testing

Jim Barron, Chair of the GEC, stated that they have been trying for some time to get student volunteers to take the ETS test, using incentives. Participation has been very low, but now we are up against the deadline for the accreditation report. The only method we have to assess Gen Ed right now is the ETS test, and the GEC recommends that we require all students to take the test after they have completed Gen Ed and before they graduate. The GEC is also unsure whether assessment of the Gen Ed program is within the Senate's purview. It was noted that the Senate may not make decisions on assessment of Gen Ed, but the Senate needs to know what's going on with the program. It was recommended that the GEC meet with Admissions & Records and anyone else who would be involved in implementation of the mandate.

Dr. Barron also noted that the GEC is proposing that students be given two options for the ETS test: test in person on one or two Saturdays, or online *proctored* testing where students would be required to pay the proctoring fee, around \$29. Distance students are already used to paying additional fees, and students who live in Billings would be motivated to take the in-person test.

It was stated that the elementary ed students should be excluded from the mandatory testing, since they already have to take the PRAXIS test which also covers Gen Ed.

D. Proposal from History Department: Eastern Montana State UniversityThe Community Task Force has discussed the idea of changing the name as well. It was agreed that the faculty should be surveyed about name changing.
