Latin American Women Crafting Change

Between August 19 and October 1, The Northcutt Steele Gallery at MSUB hosted the Latin American Women Crafting Change exhibition, which displayed vibrant and detailed "cuadros" (embroidered and appliqued fabric picture stories) meticulously crafted by women living in Pamplona Alta, a shantytown on the outskirts of Lima, Peru. The works were commissioned by Dr. Rebecca Berru-Davis, who has conducted fieldwork in Pamplona Alta since 2006. Dr. Berru Davis and the artists collaboratively curated this dynamic exhibition of "cuadros" that represent the histories, activism, religious practices, ambitions, and daily life of the artists and their community.

On September 24th, students in Dr. Rachael De La Cruz's modern Latin American history course toured the exhibit. Using WhatsApp, the students met the artists, who were simultaneously working on new "cuadros" from their homes in Pamplona Alta. Spanish-speaking students and professors translated the questions and answers in a unique cross-cultural exchange.

Student Denise Morales-Boyd, reflected that "the "cuadros" are a method to fight the external powers, because the women promote their stories in an attainable way for foreigners and countrymen alike. Despite the hardships they faced, there's an abundance of happiness displayed. As a celebration of life, these women include images with authentic representations of their Indigenous, colonial Spanish, and modern influences to display the Peru that they know."

Get to Know Our Members



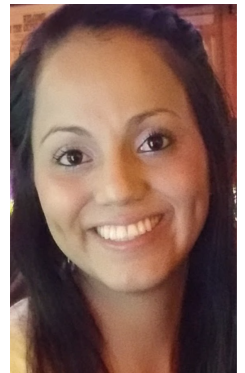
