A Place to Call Home

We have a home, space that can meet all of our needs. Our space is in the College of Education 106 office complex and includes a seminar room/lounge combination, an office for our guest writer and part-time faculty, a kitchen-like area, in addition to offices for an assistant and the director. For the first time, we will hold honors classes in our own space—this fall's Perspectives and Capstone classes—and will have a place where UHP students can relax, study, and hold meetings.



There is symbolic as well practical value to having our own dedicated space. The National Collegiate Honors Council specifies what it calls the Basic Characteristics of Fully Developed Honors Program; the document lists 17 features, most of which we have. Our new home will enable us to add two of the characteristics that we have been missing: 1) "suitable, preferably prominent, quarters on campus that provide both access for the students and a focal point for honors activity" and 2) "a locus of visibility." The latter is more of a

psychological location and speaks more to a program's reputation for

quality. A physical home will help us more firmly to establish our reputation for quality on campus.

An aside, the only characteristic that we are missing is priority registration for honors students. That is something that we can decide if we want to make a priority for the future.

The College of Education has generously allowed us to use this space, and we have agreed to move again when the childcare facility they hope to establish gets running. By then, we hope

the value of a spatial honors home will become well known and the University will provide a comparable facility elsewhere on campus.
