Dear Fellow Honors Programmers,

Our academic year is almost wrapped up, and it's been another year of high achievement. Most of this newsletter is devoted to those accomplishments, especially of our graduates. Special congratulations to Chasmin Haggerty and Jinise Trueblood who will be the first students to earn the Interdisciplinary Honors Minor. When they entered the program, we had not even thought about having a minor. If you would like to see a presentation that completes the minor, Jinise will do hers today at 10:00 in the SUB 134.

- Research and Creativity Conference The third annual conference, which we sponsor, had 112 participants this year, up from 46 its first year. One of our most important goals as a program is increasing opportunities for undergraduate research and creativity and showcasing the results. Next year, we hope to have more honors courses and contracts result in presentation at the conference. Special thanks to the UHP students who volunteered at the Conference, without whose help it would not have run as smoothly.
- Student Advisory Committee The committee met with Provost Hoar and Vice Chancellor Oravecz last week to talk about the possibility of theme housing for UHP students, space for the UHP for next year, and various academic matters, especially how to improve advising. The Committee will meet again this evening to make preliminary plans for next year. Among the ideas under discussion is having students take over part of UHP orientation activities. More to come.
- Help with Summer Orientations On Thursday noons, June 9 & 23, July 14, and August 4, there are sessions for incoming students to meet with clubs and current students. It would be great to have UHP students at these sessions. The sessions run from noon to 1:00. Please let Jenay or me know if you can help.
- Hunger Capstone Our project-based capstone will be offered again this fall. Class members will work as a team to explore and implement strategies to improve the emergency food distribution system, reduce food waste, and build a food safety-net for Billings area residents. The class will be scheduled to fit its members' schedules and is worth considering even before one is a senior, since senior years typically have demanding departmental capstone requirements.
- A Goal The newsletter illustrates some of the impressive accomplishments of our members. The Research and Creativity Conference, also an important accomplishment, has become part of MSUB academic culture, but it chiefly relies on our efforts in the office. For the future, a crucial communal goal then is becoming known for what we as a program can accomplish. That's what we will work harder on next year.

At a crucial moment in the film *The Shawshank Redemption*, Andy Defresne says to his friend Red who is afraid of change: "You're either busy living or busy dying." A variation on those words can applied to honors programs including ours, which is why even as we congratulate you on this year's achievements (individual congratulatory notes to come), we are already making plans for next year.

# 2016 Honors Graduate


#### Derrick Anderson: Business Administration


