- Special Honors Seminars and Future Courses We invite these seminars as way contributing to the academic vitality of the university by offering courses that would not otherwise be taught. With the input of from our October survey, Honors Council, and Advisory Committee, we have chosen Race in American History for spring 2017, Feminist Philosophy for fall 2018, and Mapping Literature and The Body in Contemporary Culture for spring 2018. If there are topics or professors that you would like to see in the future, let us know. In order better to facilitate your planning for the future, we will put up projected classes for future semesters on our website.
- Thinking Ahead about Scholarships Award announcements for our fall scholarships will come out later this week from the MSUB Foundations. But we have much more scholarship funds available for the spring deadline, typically about \$15,000 to award. In thinking about applying for scholarships, either ours the university's (February 1), it's to your advantage to think about a few couple things now, most notably, your credentials and possible recommenders. Credentials is the "why you question?" —what about your achievements, potential, need, and contributions to MSUB make you a person in whom the university wants to invest. As someone who writes about 20 scholarship recommendations a year now, here are some things on my mind. I want a resume or activities list; it is also helpful to a have a copy of your personal statement if it is ready in time. My letter can likely be most helpful to you if I am supporting the case you are making about yourself, hence the aforementioned materials. By the way, recommendation letters are something that I know a lot about, includes ones for the most prestigious scholarships, professional schools, and graduate universities. For a number of years, I would write up to 300 of such letters.
- Desja Eagle Tail Lecture Desja is a 2015 UHP alum, who dreams of becoming a professional singer. She already has some impressive professional achievements: a featured performer at the Alaska State Fair, two demo CDs, and a singing tour among several regional casinos. She composes some of her own songs, although she probably won't sing of these for her lecture on Native American music.

New Honors Courses Spring 2017

HONR/HSTA 494-001 Race in American History - Professor Emily Arendt

Examines the long, tangled history of race as an idea in American history from the sixteenth through the twentieth centuries. Students will be introduced to major historiographical debates surrounding key issues such as the origins of racial ideology and its relation to trans-Atlantic slavery; the changing belief of race as a cultural and/or environmentally-determined category to one based in biology and physiology; and the ways that race has historically interacted with other factors such as gender, ethnicity, and class to create structural imbalances of power in American society.

BKMT 490 Undergraduate Research – Professor AJ Otjen

Work with a client from the community to produce a branding and strategic marketing communications campaign. This course welcomes students with many talents including music, writing, graphic arts, or any major that can give input or reference to human condition and behavior. The work is almost always a service learning project and non-profit, giving the student an opportunity to affect social change.

HONR 311 Advanced Perspectives and Understanding

Cross-listed with HONR 111, but recommended for junior and senior students. Course assignments link these skills to students' major, program, or professional goals.


